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Study Guide Introduction

The term "Beatitudes" comes from the Latin "beatitudo," meaning blessedness.

At the start of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus pronounced eight profound blessings, known as the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1–12). Central to Christian teachings and embodying New Testament ethics, the Beatitudes reflect Jesus's wisdom and form a cherished core of the Sermon on the Mount.

This devotional, inspired by Dr. Mathew P. John's sermon series at Lake Avenue Church, offers a spiritual roadmap for you to meditate on. Explore these teachings and the accompanying sermon videos to be blessed by their profound insights.

Group Size

This study, based upon the *Beatitudes* book and videos, is designed to be experienced in a small group setting.

Materials Needed

Participants should have their own study guide and copy of the book *The Beatitudes: Blessings of the Kingdom.*

Group Activities/Experiences

Each study group will engage in both a Prayer Experience and a Serve Experience. Your group members will select a date and location for corporate and individual prayer. For the Serve Experience, participants will collectively select a service project to perform together as a group under the direction of the facilitator.

Facilitation

Each group will have a facilitator to lead the study, monitor discussions, prompt participation, and ensure that everyone has the opportunity to contribute. The facilitator will coordinate the Prayer and Serve Experiences.

Weekly Lessons

- 1) Sessions start with fellowship, featuring a rotating member's testimony.
- 2) Members discuss the weekly beatitude and the related sermon, having read the chapter and watched the video beforehand. Discuss the reflection questions.
- 3) It is encouraged to memorize each week's beatitude.
- 4) Sessions conclude in prayer.

01 / The Test of Discipleship

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON (Matthew 5: 1–2)

Becoming a disciple of Jesus, not merely a follower, requires sacrifices to "see God." True discipleship entails leaving the comfort of the valley to climb mountains with Jesus. Three biblical mountains symbolize this journey. On the **mountain of teaching,** we delve into God's Word. The **Mount of Transfiguration** offers a transformative encounter with Jesus. Finally, the **mountain of suffering** sees us bearing our own cross alongside Jesus, leading to eternal salvation. Each mountain provides insights that shift our perspective to align more closely with God's view.

TESTIMONY

Your group leader will start by sharing their testimony in the spirit of this lesson. We invite you also to share your own journey to becoming a Christian in the coming weeks. Giving your testimony involves recounting the path that led you to Christ. Testimonies should be brief, lasting between five and ten minutes, focusing on key moments of your journey to salvation. While sharing is optional, it is highly encouraged. Each testimony is unique, reflecting God's impact on an individual's heart. As a general guideline, your testimony can cover three phases: Life before knowing Christ, how you came to know Christ, and life after you received Him.

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02 / Blessed Are The Poor in Spirit

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of Heaven." (Matthew 5:3)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

In each of the eight Beatitudes, Jesus took worldly expectations and turned them upside down to reveal heaven's true values. These blessings show that true riches come from the heart, not material wealth. To embody Jesus's ideals, we must abandon our craving for more "stuff" and depend entirely on God. This lesson teaches the Hebrew concept of *ebion*, being poor by detaching ourselves from the material world and relying solely on God. Only then, when we place ourselves completely in God's hands will we find the blessings of His Kingdom.

- 2. Has Jesus ever turned an ideal in your life upside down?
- 3. Have you faced rejection due to financial status, education, or social standing? Conversely, have you ever dismissed someone for lacking in these areas?
- 4. Have you ever encountered a circumstance where God was your only source of help?

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03 / Blessed Are Those Who Mourn

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." (Matthew 5:4)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

This chapter explores three types of tears that receive God's blessing. Our spiritual journey commences with **tears of repentance** as we acknowledge our sinfulness and cry out to God. As our spiritual journey continues, God uses trials to draw us closer to Him, revealing Himself as our Good Shepherd in the midst of these **tears of trial**. These experiences refine our ability to discern His voice. Then, we learn to emulate Jesus by sharing the pain of others, shedding **tears of empathy**. Ultimately, our hearts align with God's as we grieve for each lost soul and empathize with His sorrows.

PRAYER EXPERIENCE

The second Beatitude builds on our recognition of our own poverty of spirit and our emotional response of sorrow over others' pain and need for salvation. We gain purpose in our pain. As we are reminded that God blesses the broken, such times of trouble call for prayer. It is thus appropriate to join with others in your study group in calling upon the Lord. Your group can decide together on a location and date to meet for prayer. You can use the following prayer acrostic, which can be helpful in structuring one's thoughts to engage the Lord in meaningful prayer.

P-R-A-Y ACROSTIC

P- PRAISE

- Worship God for who He is and what He has done.
- Pray through a praise psalm such as Psalm 103.

R- REPENT

- \circ $\,$ Confess your sins to God and acknowledge your need for Jesus.
- Read Galatians 5:16-26. Confess any shortcomings that these verses reveal in your life.
- \circ $\,$ Confess any other sins that you can think of.
- Ask God to renew His strength in you and assure you of the forgiveness you have received in Christ.

A- ASK

- \circ $\;$ Intercede for particular needs in your own life and the lives of others.
- Pray for your individual needs.
- Pray for your friends and family.
- Pray for our church, its ministries, and its leaders.
- Pray for those who do not know Jesus.
- Pray for our country and state leaders.
- Pray for missionaries whom you know.
- Pray for the persecuted church.
- Pray for the world's unreached peoples.

Y- YIELD

- $_{\odot}$ $\,$ Surrender your day and life to following Jesus wherever He leads.
- Spend some time giving over to Him all areas of life.
- Ask for God's will to guide your thoughts, words, actions, work, school, families, and decisions for our future.
- Spend time praying for your week ahead and items on your schedule, and ask God to work in you as you surrender these things to Him.

- 2. Why does the Good Shepherd lead His flock through the Valley of the Shadow of Death?
- 3. Have you ever shed tears for others? If so, how did it transform you?

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04 / Blessed Are The Meek

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." (Matthew 5:5)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

Even though the world may view meekness as weakness, meekness actually requires inner strength to control one's power. The Greek word *praus* is commonly translated to a disposition of humility, gentleness, and a willingness to submit to God's will. In the context of this Beatitude where Jesus says, "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth," *praus* conveys a sense of strength under control, humility, and a gentle spirit that trusts in God. True meekness does not involve trying to eradicate all anger entirely. It is appropriate to demonstrate righteous anger toward sin, such as injustice and corruption. After all, both Moses and Jesus, described by God as meek, got angry at sin. This is the only beatitude to offer a physical rather than spiritual reward.

SERVE EXPERIENCE

To apply the study of chapter 6, "Blessed Are The Merciful," each group will engage in a serve experience to abundantly serve God. Together, members will choose when and where to volunteer, contributing to the needs of their church, community, or other ministries. Groups should anticipate participating in the Serve Experience during or around their study of chapter 6, "Blessed Are The Merciful."

- 1. How does understanding the meaning of *praus* as a warhorse change your understanding of meekness?
- 2. What makes you angry? Does your anger originate from a self-centered ego or a selfless concern for others?
- 3. What do you learn from the way Jesus and Moses demonstrated meekness?
- 4. Has your meekness ever been rewarded physically?

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05 / Blessed Are Those Who Hunger and Thirst for Righteousness

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied." (Matthew 5:6)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

Christianity stands apart from other religions by emphasizing a craving and intense desire for righteousness rather than simply demanding it. Jesus recognized our inability to achieve righteousness on our own merit, going beyond a mere tally of good versus bad deeds. God requires perfection, which Jesus, by becoming human, balances on our behalf. True blessedness is found not in attaining flawless righteousness, but in harboring a profound longing for it. When we sincerely hunger and thirst for righteousness, God satisfies that longing, accrediting us with the righteousness of Jesus.

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06 / Blessed Are The Merciful

"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy." (Matthew 5:7)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

When Jesus talked about being merciful, He referred to the Hebrew term *hesed*, meaning intense empathy and experiencing things from others' perspective. Jesus demonstrated *hesed* both horizontally and vertically. Horizontally, He showed *hesed* by becoming human and living among us, and He continues to advocate for us by practicing **intercession** for us in heaven. Vertically, Jesus showed *hesed* through his **incarnation**, submitting to the Father's will by dying for all of humanity. This act reveals true mercy, which requires sacrificial love for others — not just by monetary donations, but by giving of ourselves through acts such as intercessory prayer and evangelism.

SERVE EXPERIENCE

In keeping with this beatitude in finding grace to help others in time of needs, your group will participate in the Serve Experience discussed earlier in Session 4. Your group leader will coordinate the details of your group's serving opportunity.

- 1. How does the Jewish understanding of *hesed* differ from the popular perception of mercy?
- 2. Jesus practiced *hesed* both horizontally and vertically. How can we follow His example and do likewise?
- 3. How can we practice *hesed* in our intercessory prayers?
- 4. How does the cross signify the ultimate expression of *hesed?*

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07 / Blessed Are The Pure in Heart

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." (Matthew 5:8)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

When Jesus talked about seeing God in this beatitude, He wasn't referring to seeing God with our eyes but rather with our hearts. Because Jesus became human, we are able to understand Him and have a genuine relationship with Him. He reveals God's true nature of love and truth to us, allowing us to experience God personally. This is possible because God created a "hidden code" in our hearts — our conscience — which directs us to Him through an instinctive recognition of God's Law. However, sin interferes with our ability to connect with God, so we need to be cleansed by Jesus's sacrifice on the cross. Our role is to keep our eyes on the Lord and surrender our hearts to Him.

SERVE EXPERIENCE

Please open this week by debriefing the Serve Experience, discussing the following questions: Where did you see God's presence? What did you find challenging or rewarding?

- 2. How did God show Himself to the world in Jesus Christ?
- 3. How do we prepare our hearts to behold the glory of God?

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08 / Blessed Are The Peacemakers

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God." (Matthew 5:9)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

Peace is being in harmony with God in all aspects of our lives. The Bible points out three types of peace to seek. First, we must have **peace with ourselves** through a clean conscience. With this inner peace, we are able to establish **peace with others** in the form of social harmony. However, true peace from conflicts only comes when we establish **peace with God**, which is possible by letting Jesus serve as a bridge between us and God. Once we have this peace with God, it is our responsibility to serve as a bridge between the church and the world, spreading the message of peace. It is not enough to merely love peace; we must actively strive to make it.

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09 / Blessed Are The Persecuted

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 5:10)

THE HEART OF THIS LESSON

Jesus warned us that we will experience trials and persecution. In the first century, it was illegal to be a Christian, and many people were killed in gruesome ways. However, instead of being destroyed by persecution, Christians rejoiced that they were worthy to suffer for Jesus. This persecution led to growth in three ways. It **broke stagnation**, forcing Christians to abandon complacency. Further, it **unified the church** as Christians supported each other. It also **deployed the church**, causing the Christians to scatter throughout the world, spreading the message of salvation with them. Through all this, persecution strengthened the church and will continue to do so.
